



## BPA Bloodline Survey



The Annual Bloodline Survey has just been completed. As the name suggests the primary function of this exercise is to identify the Bloodlines within each breed which are in danger of being lost.

All our pedigree pig breeds have relatively small populations. One of the biggest threats faced by breeds with a limited population is inbreeding or loss of genetic diversity. Saving our pedigree pig breeds is not just a numbers game. 1000 unrelated sows is better than 3000 sows who are all half sisters. Each breed has a number of sire and dam lines. These are the breeds genetic capital. Conserving this genetic capital is just as important as conserving our financial assets.

The Bloodline surveys help to pinpoint which lines are under threat so that action can be taken to make sure that we don't lose any lines from within a breed. Over the years there have been many cases where the survey results have set off alarms bells. The breed reps and surveyors have been able to track down the last few sows, make sure that they produce a few more pedigree litters and that those pigs are spread around amongst willing breeders.

These Bloodline surveys were started in the 1980's by the Rare Breeds Survival Trust with the help of a team of dedicated volunteers some of whom are still helping with the surveys today. At that time many of our breeds were in a much worse state than they are now. It is no exaggeration when we say that these surveys and the hard working volunteers who help to compile the results have been one of the most important factors in saving some of our breeds from extinction.

After investing in a new computer database for our pedigree records in 2003 it made sense for the surveys to be carried out by the British Pig Association. We have been developing and improving the Bloodline Surveys over the last few years so that they are integrated with the pedigree database. We now have system that can more easily cope with the increasing number of pig keepers and pigs but it is still dependant on you the members responding to the survey.

Every year a team of hard working surveyors undertake the monumental task of phoning our membership and asking them to complete their surveys. Whether they offer to help complete your survey on-line or just jog your memory to send your completed form back to the office, they play an essential part in helping to get accurate and timely results. One or two have reported receiving a less than friendly reception when phoning round this year. Of course we are all suspicious of cold calls but please remember that our surveyors are volunteers, giving up their time for free to help ensure the survival of our pedigree pig breeds. We should be thanking them not putting the phone down.

If you don't complete your survey and tell us which pigs are still in your herd then we will make some assumptions based on the age of the pigs and their breeding history. This may mean that your pigs will be "killed off". Of course they can be "resurrected" but it wastes everyone's time. If you didn't complete a survey this year please put January 10<sup>th</sup> 2011 in your diary and make a New Year's Resolution to complete your survey. You will be part of one of the largest and most successful conservation projects ever and isn't that one of the reasons why you became a pedigree breeder in the first place?

On the following pages you will find the results for each of our pedigree breeds with a short surveyors report. In the past we have divided our breeds into Modern and Traditional. This was brought in to replace Major and Minor breeds classifications. Modern Breeds were those breeds which had undergone breed improvement programmes in the 60's and 70's and Traditional breeds were those that a Government report in the 50's deemed surplus to requirements. Nowadays of course Conservation, Biodiversity and Sustainable Development are key themes in British Government Agricultural Policy. The Standing Committee on Farm Animal Genetic Resources (FAnGR) advises Ministers on policy affecting our pedigree pig breeds. They look at breeds in terms of Native and Non-Native. Our survey figures are used by the FAnGR Committee and so this year they are published in a slightly different order. Native Traditional Breeds come first followed by Native Modern Breeds and then Non-Native breeds.

Over the last few years we have moved the survey dates from November to January. We have decided to publish the latest results as 2010 rather than 2009. The series 2007 to 2010 covers 27 months and so there is no missing year.

The Berkshire figures are, on the whole, encouraging. They show a rise in numbers in most of the individual bloodlines, and also in the total number of Pedigree breeders with Berkshire pigs.

However there are still some areas of concern. For example, there is only a very small increase in the number of sows with birth notified litters, from which pigs can then be entered in the Herd Book. The main increase in sow numbers is with sows from which progeny has not been birth notified and these pigs are therefore permanently excluded from pedigree breeding.

Overall the number of registered Berkshire boars has increased but 2 lines *Freight Train* and *Lassetter* show a further drop in numbers, with the *Lassetter* giving particular cause for concern. This *Lassetter* line was introduced into the Berkshire breed, with the help of the RBST, by the late Geoffrey Cloke as recently as 1992 and it would be a pity if its future is not made more secure. I would therefore very much appreciate hearing from anyone with litters from registered *Lassetter* boars.

All the female lines seem to be holding up well with Royal *Lustre*, although fractionally down on last year, once again proving the most popular female bloodline. The lowest numbers are again in the, *Mermaid*, one of the oldest bloodlines in the Berkshire breed.

Finally, I would like to thank all the Berkshire breeders for their valuable help and co-operation over completing the survey.

An increase of 39 breeders has helped lift the number of registered sows by 155 and boars by 36. As usual Countess, Dahlia, Primrose and Princess Freda continue to be the lowest in numbers. Star is the only line to show a large drop of 50%. Thanks to all who replied, we would encourage you to notify all your litters to continue the breed's growth and maintain its integrity.

**British Saddleback** - Many thanks to all those members who completed their surveys. The results and figures, on the face of it, look to show improvement in numbers of both breeders and pigs. However, what is worrying is the percentage of breeding sows that did not produce birth notified litters (almost 50%) to keep the bloodlines in a better position. The Molly line is only pedigree functioning at just over 33% as only 4 of 13 sows produced birth notified litters. That is more worrying than the Red Rose where 66% of the 6 sows are producing pedigree pigs of the bloodline for the future.

The focus on improving low numbered lines works, and works quickly when you consider the improvement to the Rose, Spot and Viscount lines. For those of you reading these notes with a view to helping rare lines I suggest you consider the Colleen, Duchess, Molly, Lassie, Lucy and Gamma female lines. With the boars clearly Earl Simon and Walter with only two breeders each, need some help. The Mary line is one which has been addressed during the survey and in two years time I would hope to see double figures for the line again.

On a positive note, it is good to see that there has been a 10% increase in the numbers of keepers of Large Blacks from last year, and a 15% increase in total sows over this period too. What is concerning though is that there is no increase in sows with birth notified progeny. I hope this is because the extra females are young gilts that are due to give birth soon.

There is cause for concern over some of the lines. In the females, the Blackie, Dorothy and Gold Vase only have one sow each that has birth notified progeny, with the Julia having two. It is hoped that this year we can get some youngstock coming through to boost these numbers.

In the boars, the Defender line is also very low. Although there is semen in the tanks for this line this is no real substitute and we need to make a concerted effort to get progeny from this line to replace some of the older boars that are still out there.

The overall number of sows has increased but mainly in the registered sows without birth notified stock, so losing them from the active breeding pool. From talking to some of the owners of these it seems that some are just kept as pets or for the occasional cross bred litter.

The Fair Ladys had the greatest increase. The Alma Rose causes concern as they dropped by six, as do the Modiste, Purity and Lady's Maid lines. The Silk has held up their increase. This emphasizes how important these yearly surveys are, keeping track of the various bloodlines. The boar lines are relatively stable except for the Sovereign.

This year's survey was carried out without the added pressure of Christmas looming - a fact that was appreciated by both Surveyor and Surveyed! This year we simplified the survey by only asking about pigs that were already registered which made the whole process an order of magnitude easier.

The number of members who completed their own survey on-line was up – a trend that is expected to continue and my thanks to those of you who did that as it cuts down the Surveyors job and also eliminates the need to use up BPA office resources transcribing paper returns.

One key fact that emerged was that the majority (yes majority!) of members had at least one element of their contact details that were either wrong or out of date. With increasing numbers of people being “ex Directory” it became a bit of a detective challenge to contact some of you. Please can you make sure you keep your contact details up to date – very easy to do in the members section of the website – Now you know why the BPA never seem to send you a Newsletter!

The results themselves were very very encouraging with all of the 13 female lines and all of the 4 male bloodlines showing a year on year increase.

Total numbers up 62% in the year! And the numbers of BPA members keeping OS&B up by a similar amount.

The rise is so big that we must all be on our guard to ensure that we do not collectively allow the quality standards to drop and thus undo all of the hard work over the last few years. This will need the support of the more experienced breeders to help and mentor those new to our Breed. I am more than happy to send out copies of the Breed Standard on request.

Thank you to all of you that made this year's survey the success that it was.

**British Landrace.** The response to this year's survey, although slow, has been fairly encouraging. It is pleasing to note that the tide of reduction in female numbers has turned. There is a slight increase in numbers from the previous survey year ( 561 from 523 in 2009) Boar numbers however, still give rise for concern. A reduction of 13 to an all time low of 56.

The number of members keeping registered pigs is down from 24 to 20. It should be noted that a proportion of these members do not register or birth notify there Landrace pigs and are kept purely for commercial production. The number of supportive pedigree breeders is closer to 10 than 20, which in itself is fragile. There still remains little interest from new members who want to keep Landrace pigs.

The female lines remain reasonably stable, with one casualty being Atla (originating at Mossbrook) being lost this year. Several other female lines are down to one sow. One of these being Ally, that still remains in my own herd and originating from the old imported sow, Ally av Rya that had such a tremendous influence at Bluegate,

Moving on to the boars, Norton with 8 representatives leads the way. Concern should once again be expressed on a number of the old established boar lines that remain very vulnerable. It is very encouraging to report that Sarah Jane Stephens at Fern is registering pigs again and several of these families remain safe for the time being.

The Candidus boar is without representation for the first time in many years. A Duke bred in the Dennett herd is now standing at AI and I would encourage breeders to use this boar.

Last year I asked you 'where have all the Large White gone'. Well you have certainly found them!. Females are up almost 30% from 667 to 939 and the boars up again from 114 to 142. The most encouraging data to come out of the survey is that there are now 42 breeders keeping Large Whites, against 29 at the same time last year.

The majority of female lines are strong in number. However, Dainty Girl, Greenback, Greta, Maple Leaf and Royal Maple could do with some help. If you are looking to introduce another family to your herd, then perhaps these are the ones to consider. Royal Catalina remains the strongest line, closely followed by Blackberry. It is pleasing to report that there have been no lines lost during this survey period.

On the boar front, the old established English male lines continue to drive numbers forward. We have a lot to be thankful for to past master breeders in developing these outstanding sires of the breed that, continue after some six decades to breed true. Followers of Large White pedigrees will see that Solihull, Histon, Harleston, Wall and Thingoe blood continues to dominate the best families within the breed.

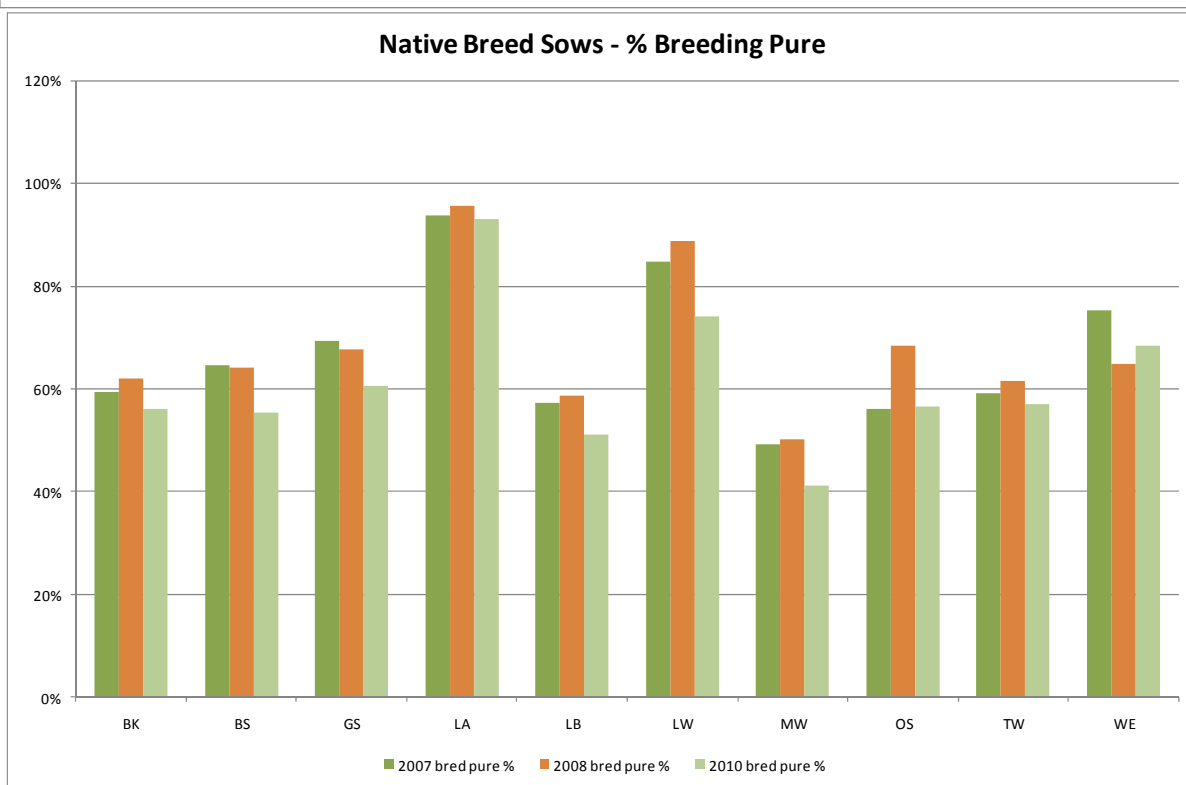
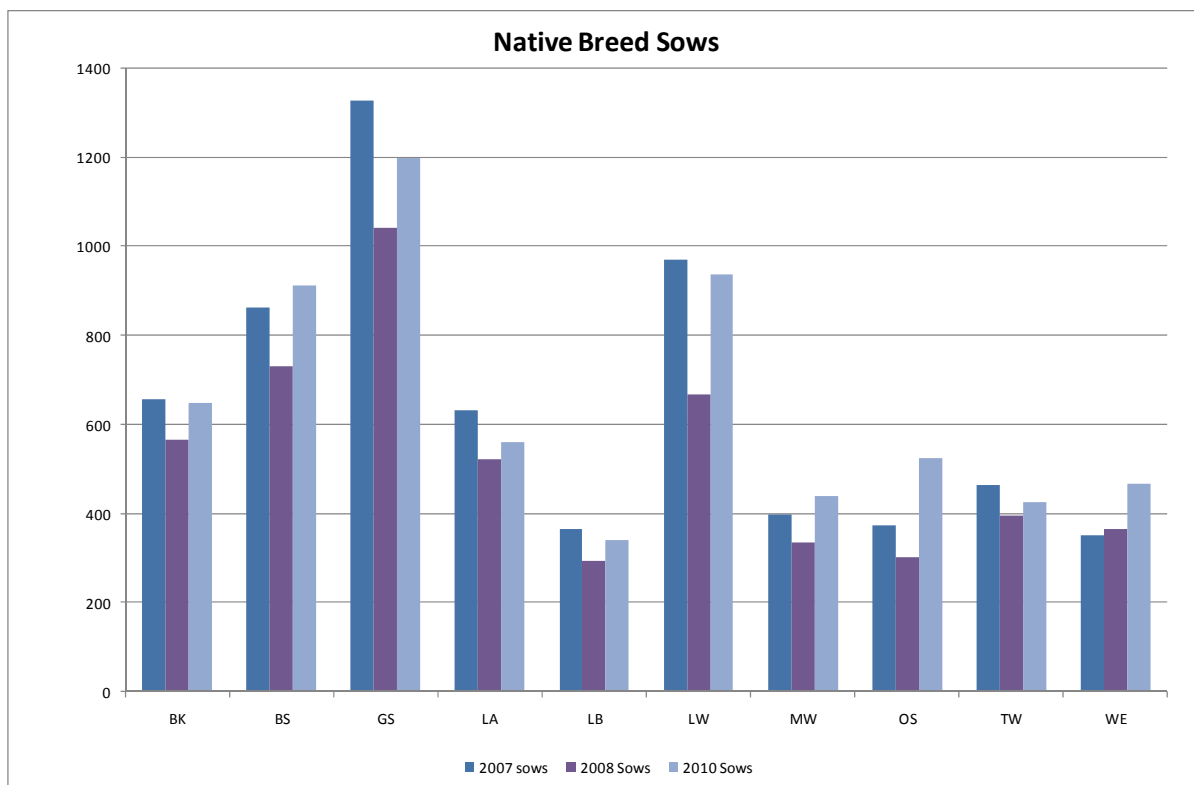
My thanks to all of you that replied to the survey. I believe it to be one of the most accurate that has taken place to date and you should be applauded for your efforts.

This year's figures show an encouraging trend upwards with 81 more sows and 37 more boars breeding but we have a long way to go to reach our ambition of 2000 sow. With 25 female lines and 11 boar lines we have plenty of lines to avoid in-breeding. We need to keep a close eye on the rare lines especially Dainty Girl, Goldilocks, Impish and Jean and the Ivor boars. We have 8 new Welsh Breed members joined the B.P.A. since 1st Jan 2010 so hopefully this next year will see a big increase in the population.

In the past we have classified our pig breeds as Major and Minor breeds and more recently as Modern and Traditional. In reality all our pedigree breeds are of equal importance to the Association but it does make sense to group them together sometimes. For the purposes of conservation the logical grouping starts with Native and Non-native breeds. The UK is a signatory to various international conventions which require the government to conserve our native breeds. It is these native breeds which take priority in government policies such as the Breeds at Risk Register.

This years survey has been split into native and non native breeds. We will need to develop slightly different strategies for the two groups and this work will be undertaken by the new Breed Development and Conservation Committee.

On the left you will see summary figures for our native breeds showing a recovery in numbers after a disappointing year in 2008. (please note that there is not a missing year for 2009 - we have simply moved the survey period from before Christmas to after Christmas). Some breeds have recovered beyond their 2008 position whilst others have not been able to reach the same heights. Only the Welsh has seen a steady increase in numbers.

The total number of breeding sows is only the first measure of a breed's risk status. It is also important to look at how many of those females are producing pedigree offspring. The second graph illustrates that only the British Landrace sows are producing levels of pedigree litters over the 80% threshold recommended by international guidelines.

A three year rolling average of these two risk factors is shown in the table and it is these figures that are used by government when reviewing the Breeds at Risk Register.

In addition to the sow numbers and pedigree litters we should also consider geographical concentration and effective population size. The latter is a calculation made by geneticists based on the number of boars and sows in a breed. Geographical concentration is a particular problem in the British Landrace and our consultant geneticist Dr Rex Walters has advised that based on effective population size the British Landrace, Large Black and Middle

There are 12 breeders keeping Hampshires in the United Kingdom. The total number of females shows an increase of 16 to 57 whilst boar numbers have remained static at 11. The biggest problem facing the breed is the very small genetic diversity in mainland Britain with only 3 female lines and 4 male lines. With this in mind it is important that breeders regularly rotate boars to prevent inbreeding and sell unwanted boars to other breeders, we cannot afford to lose a boar line.

In the future there will hopefully be some unrelated stock available from Nigel Overend in Northern Ireland whose stock is completely unrelated to any on the mainland.

For a breed that has only 12 breeders it is good to see that at least 4 of these breeders were showing last year, often in the same classes as the Durocs, but for 2010 several shows are holding Hampshire classes so please support these classes and help promote our breed

The first meeting of this committee was held on Tuesday 24th November 2009 at Stoneleigh Park.

Present: G Kiddy (Chair), S Booth, T Bretherton, A Gready, R Lutwyche, J Millard, D Norman, R Overend, S Richardson, A Robinson, A Rose, C Vaughan, J Wreakes, F Slade (Honorary Vice President) and M Bates (Secretary). Apologies were received from: C Coe and S Loveless.

Andrew Robinson was appointed as Deputy Chair of the committee; his knowledge of herd books will be invaluable to the deliberations of this committee. Tracey Bretherton and John Millard were appointed as Council deputies.

It was agreed that Rex Walters would be co-opted onto the committee to provide genetic advice and it is hoped he will come to the next meeting to talk about genetic analysis & BLUP. It was also agreed to speak to Andrew Walton to see if his expertise could assist the committee.

The objectives of the committee were agreed as follows Herdbook publication – The committee agreed that hardback volumes of the herdbook should continue to be published. An editing sub committee, comprising Andrew Robinson, Richard Lutwyche, Guy Kiddy, Stephen Booth and Steve Richardson, was established to oversee the annual publication of the Herdbooks and to try & complete some of the missing years herdbooks. .

Genetic Analysis - The committee agreed that the Geneped software should be used to identify genetically unique pigs for both in-situ and ex situ conservation programmes. The committee also proposed developing a method to monitor inbreeding that could be used by members for sire selection.

Estimated Breeding Values – This was felt to be important especially to the modern breeds to help in the selling of breeding stock both at home and abroad.

DNA testing – The committee agreed that parentage testing for pedigree litters should be the priority for this programme but that it was a lower priority than other aspects of the committees work.

Breed Surveys – The committee discussed the proposed schedule for the 2009 survey and agreed a January start date. It was agreed to exclude birth notified pigs from the survey to make it simpler to complete.

Heritage Semen Bank – Semen from an Oxford Sandy & Black boar is shortly to be added to the bank. A working group has been set up to draw up a list of boars to be added to the semen bank and to look at the possibility of sponsorship. Steve Richardson agreed to lead on this with help from Robert Overend and Alan Rose.

Guy Kiddy proposed tapping into training funds to develop workshops for pedigree breeding as an important part of conservation was to select better animals as the parents of the next generation. He agreed to draw up a training proposal to be submitted for 50% grant funding. Two courses have now been accepted for funding by Landskills East

The Committee met for the second time on April 8th 2010. Following a presentation from Dr Rex Walters outlining a number of genetics based projects the committee prioritised two projects

Estimated Breeding Values for all pedigree breeds. This will allow interested breeders to submit additional information on their birth notes as well as performance information such as growth rates and backfat levels. A very sophisticated computer programme will then link this with all the information on litter size and rebreeding intervals in each pigs pedigree to identify the pigs that have best breeding potential according to tailor made criteria for each breed.

Genetic Analysis. Small populations are at risk from inbreeding. This project will analyse our most vulnerable breeds to identify the animals that have the rarest genes. These pigs can then be selected for conservation breeding programmes to ensure that their genes are not lost to the breed.

The committee also discussed the simplification of the pedigree naming system and clarification of the rules on herd prefixes.

Other items on the agenda included the Bloodline Surveys, the Breeds at Risk Register and the Heritage Semen Bank. A more detailed report will be published in the committees news section on the BPA website in due course.

**Breeds at Risk Register.** Discussions are on-going with government over the future of this register. Thanks to the work of the Standing Committee on Farm Animal Genetic Resources Committee, Defra now includes Breeds at Risk policy in all disease control legislation. The recently published control strategy for Classical Swine Fever has a whole chapter on Breeds on Risk but it is only the Foot and Mouth legislation that requires us to keep a list of premises with rare breeds. Spending cuts could see the Breeds at Risk Register scrapped. Both the BPA and Rare Breeds Survival Trust see this as a backwards step and we are urging Animal Health, Defra and devolved governments to continue support for the register.

The good news is that after more than 5 years of negotiations Ministers finally agreed (before they went of on the campaign trail) to drop the minimum herd size of 3 females and 1 male for pigs on the register. Now any pedigree pig which is on the Breeds at Risk Register can be eligible for special measures in the event of a disease outbreak. **Heritage Semen Bank.** The BPA and the Rare Breeds Survival Trust have been working together to build a bank of frozen semen. The semen is collected and frozen by the Deerpark AI centre in Northern Ireland. So far only half of our boar lines have been frozen and the project is hampered by lack of funds. Large scale sponsorship is urgently required for this vitally important project. If members have any ideas about possible sponsors or fundraising that could help us to secure the future of our breeds please contact Steve Richardson of the Conservation Committee.

One way that members can help this project is to use the boars when they are standing at stud. Each boar that goes in for semen freezing is also available for sales of fresh semen and this helps to fund the project. A list of some of the boars that are presently available is shown below. An Oxford Sandy & Black boar from the Jack line will soon be available and later in the year there will be Defender and Majestic Eagle boars from the Large Blacks and a Tamworth Dream Boy.
